Negotiations Continue

Negotiations between the Natural Resource Defense Council (NRDC) and Friant Water Users Authority (FWUA) continue to progress. Efforts initiated in late 2005 by U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein and Congressman George Radanovich, supported by the entire Central Valley delegation, have been on-going for several months. All parties involved continue to report progress is being made and remain resolute about achieving an outcome. Valley Water Alliance remains supportive of the settlement discussions and will be critically assessing any deal once it becomes public.

At press time Judge Lawrence Karlton had once again postponed the court date for the case as a result of the positive progress report he received concerning negotiations.

Focusing on Tomorrow

More than sixty years ago, when the foundation of our economy was based predominately in agriculture, the San Joaquin Valley was failing because the industry did not have a reliable water supply to meet demand. The State of California and Federal government recognized the need for a stimulus to provide continued growth and economic expansion. A developed water supply, and thus the efficient use of the resource, was determined to be a priority for economic stimulus by local, state and federal officials.

The construction of Friant Dam and associated canals by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation would create the environment necessary to achieve water supply reliability and continued economic growth. The decision subsequently created the number one agricultural region in the world. Eventually, diversified growth has manifested into a thriving economy of families, communities, businesses, both small and large, and agriculture.

But we still have a problem. A problem threatening our families, communities, businesses and agriculture, a problem we should all care about solving. The Friant water system created an incredibly productive region and that region could be lost if water supply reliability is not assured in conjunction with a desire for restoration of the San Joaquin River. Restoration, which depending on how it is completed, could erode the very foundation for our Valley's economy that was constructed more than a quarter century ago.

For the past 17 years litigation initiated by the Natural Resource Defense Council (NRDC) has attempted to undermine our South Valley's water supply. Notwithstanding the agreement of all official forums of government and local citizens, a federal judge in San Francisco ruled in 2004 an obscure state law must be given priority and the San Joaquin River restored sufficiently to become a fish habitat.

The essence of the judge's ruling was to mandate turning back the clock more than sixty years in the River's history that would have a profound affect on our Valley economy and our existing way of life. The threat

Dear Madam Secretary,

A number of top officials in my administration were recently briefed by Interior and Justice Department staff, the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) and the Friant Water Users Authority (Friant) on the progress of settlement negotiations in NRDC v. Rodgers, et al. As you know, that case concerns the operation of Friant Dam on the San Joaquin River, one of California's most important water resources. The case has been pending for more than seventeen years.
